Read to Yourself (and Your Children): Welcome to Or Ami's Tashlich service. Together we will create a meaningful experience here at the beach. Please make it easier by holding your children close, and singing and reading loudly. During Tashlich and after, please remember that if you brought children with you, YOU are responsible for the supervision and safety of your own children. Always know where they are and watch over them. Also, as you leave the beach, please clean up trash, drive carefully, and be patient as our cars exit.

Read Together: The Hebrew word "Tashlich" means "casting or throwing." We have come to this vast ocean to symbolically cast away our sins. The prophet Micah, referring to how God helps remove the people Israel's sins, said: "You, O God, will cast all our sins into the depths of the sea". Today, as waves carry our crumbs away, we hope that God will help us cast away our own misdeeds. We throw crumbs into the water,

so that God's creatures may eat, for in this season, we try to balance our moral setbacks with acts that promote life.

Ba-ruch A-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, bo-ray mee-nay v'sa-meem.

("Blessed is Adonai our God, Guide of the Universe, Creator of varied kinds of spices.")

Sing La, la, la... (When the Rabbi raises the Havdala candle, sing...)

Ba-ruch A-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, bo-ray m'o-ray ha-aish.

(Meaning: "Blessed is Adonai our God, Guide of the Universe, Creator of illuminating fire.")

Ba-ruch A-tah Adonai, E-lo-hay-nu Me-lech ha-o-lam, ha-mav-deel ben ko-desh l'chol.

(Meaning: "Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Guide of the Universe, who separates sacred from the regular, light from darkness, this holy day from the six working days. Blessed is Adonai, who separates the sacred from the regular.)
